If you happen upon the tiny northeastern Ohio town of Twinsburg and begin to see double, don't panic. Just check your calendar-it's probably Aug. 6 or 7. Those are the dates for this year's Twins Days in Twinsburg.

This two-day gathering of clones opens with-what else-the Seeing Double Parade, which attracts some 12,000 spectators. As for the number of twins, Twins Days Committee President Andy Miller expects a record 1,700 pairs this year.

Twinsburg was named in honor of the town's two most unusual citizens, identical twins Moses and Aaron Wilcox. According to Ripley's Believe It or Not!, the brothers "married sisters, were lifelong business partners, and were stricken with the same ailment on the same day. Both died on Sept. 24, 1827, and were buried in the same grave!"
