The evening will include "Some of the finest holograms from all over the world," says Laraine, adding that the science of holography is much better known elsewhere in the world than in the US.

Both holography and video are in rapid stages of development and growth, and parallels exist between the two mediums. It promises to be an unusual and informative evening.
